# Making Connections Through Family Camp

When a child is diagnosed with cancer, a family's world is turned upside down, and the word "normal" takes on new meaning. Giving families the opportunity to connect with others who understand the challenges of caring for a child with cancer is what Family Camp is all about. Below you'll hear from two mothers who call Family Camp "life changing."

### THE GRIMM FAMILY

After a weekend at Family Camp, Amy Grimm didn't want to leave. "It was amazing and life-changing for me," Amy says. "I felt so free,



Held at Camp Twin Lakes-Rutledge, Camp Sunshine offers Family Camp four times a year, twice in the spring and twice in the fall. Fall Family Camp dates: October 2-4 and October 9-11 happy and relaxed being there. The activities for children and adults were great, and the team-building activities helped break the ice in meeting other parents who were going through the same thing."

Last October, the Grimm's 8-year-old daughter, Gabriella, was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL). Suddenly the family – which includes 4-year-old Darrow and husband Ray – was launched into a journey that included eight months of treatment. During the first four months, Gabriella spent 32 days at Scottish Rite.

It was at the hospital that Amy learned about Camp Sunshine. They attended two Spa Sydell nights at Camp Sunshine House before going to their first Family Camp in April. Amy and Ray, who didn't know quite what to expect, hoped that attending the camp as a family would get Gabriella interested in summer camp. The weekend went well beyond their expectations. "This place changed my life and brought new insight into our journey," Amy says. "It gave us time together without the stress of daily life and things that get in the way of family time."

She says she is also grateful for the supportive and comforting environment that Family Camp provides. "I met people from all different places and backgrounds," she says. "Even though we may not have spoken with everyone there, I consider them family."

Gabriella is now in remission and undergoing a rigorous maintenance program to keep the cancer at bay. And her parents' original goal for

attending Family Camp was achieved: She attended her first junior camp this summer.

#### THE BROWN FAMILY

One of the families the Grimms may have run into is Shavonn Brown and her children, Justice and Arianna. Since 2012, the Browns have been to six Family Camps.

"It's like going to Disney World," Shavonn says. "The activities, the camaraderie, it is the best thing ever."

The Brown's first experience at Family Camp was transformative *Continued on Page 5*

# Erin's Story



"There has hardly been a milestone in my life that isn't wrapped up in Camp Sunshine in some way. I often tell people that it is the most restorative and refreshing place I can imagine, both as a camper and a counselor."

When Erin Gibson Hulsey was at Scottish Rite Hospital in 1985 receiving treatment for Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (ALL), she had an important goal in mind: to attend Camp Sunshine.

"Someone had placed a Camp Sunshine yearbook in my hands and I carefully and longingly studied every black and white photo," Erin recalls. "The children and teens were laughing and messy and outdoors, and I thought, 'where could I sign up?"

Erin, who was just five at the time, was crushed when she learned that campers had to be at least seven years old to attend. She became fixated on the future date when she could go to camp, often asking the staff, "Are you sure I can't go?"

"I don't think I wavered once," says Erin, who was in treatment for three years and has been cancer free ever since. "I was

In 1987, when she was finally old enough, she realized her dream of going to Camp Sunshine, creating life-long memories and making new friends. And

she's been every year since, first as a camper, and then as a volunteer. She returned this summer for her 29th year.

"Camp means so much to me," Erin says. "There has hardly been a milestone in my life that isn't wrapped up in Camp Sunshine in some way. I often tell people that it is the most restorative and refreshing place I can imagine, both as a camper and a counselor."

Erin graduated from Berry College in 2002 and has worked in public relations

for a German company and as a sixth grade language arts teacher. She married her husband, Logan, in 2006, and says it was part of their "unspoken vows" that she continue to volunteer at summer camp for a week as well as family camp for two

> weekends a year – no matter where they were living or how many children they had.

Logan supports that and takes a week off from work to care for their two children, Amelia, 5, and Caleb, 2, when Erin is at summer camp. Over the years, nothing has stopped her, even her two pregnancies. In fact, in 2010 she had to

leave camp early to come home to deliver Amelia, who was born ahead of schedule.

Erin considers it a gift to volunteer, and says the experience gets better every year.

"It is so amazing to be able to watch kids thrive," she says, "like seeing a nonswimmer learn how to swim, or describing fireworks to a blind child. To observe those miracles while helping the camp run smoothly means so much to me. I am honored to be a part of that team."\*

## Brookwood Hills Swims for Camp Sunshine

On May 30, over 100 members of the Brookwood Hills swim team – known as the "Bullfrogs" – were traversing the lanes of the swimming pool not in a race, but in efforts to raise money for Camp Sunshine.

For the last 12 years, the Brookwood Hills swim team has held a Swim-a-Thon, earning money for each lap they swim.

"We ask swimmers to go out and get pledges from friends and families," says Brookwood Hills swim coach Tim Storsteen. "Then on the day of the swim-a-thon, the swimmers have two hours to complete as many laps as possible in that time frame. Tim says this year there was a six-year-old girl who completed over 100 laps (about a mile and a half) and two 11-year-olds who swam 248 laps each (about three-and-half miles) in two hours. "It's a great event for everyone," Tim says.

The Swim-a-Thon started as a fun way for the swimmers to raise money for charity. After two Brookwood Hills families were touched by childhood cancer several years ago, Tim decided to direct the funds towards Camp Sunshine.

"I felt a closer connection to Camp Sunshine than the other charities we had raised money for because we had families who were directly affected by the generosity of the organization," he says. "We also have a family that volunteers their time each summer to camp. So, it just felt right that our community could reach out and help Camp Sunshine."

Last year the team raised just over \$4,700 and this year the swimmers surpassed that by bringing in \$6,100.

"This swim team is really a great program and schedules many social activities beyond just practices and meets," says Mary Clancy Peak, chair of the Swim-a-Thon. "This is the one activity that helps the kids give back to the community."

They also had fun while doing it. Mary Clancy worked with Chick-fil-A, Inc. to get chicken biscuits and a prize basket donated, and the Chick-fil-A at Peachtree and Collier also brought the Chickfil-A cow for photo ops and treated the participants to plush cows and free sandwich offers.

"Also, we had a tie-dye party after the event for the kids to extend the fun," Mary Clancy says. "Prizes for the most money raised were Chick-fil-A and Coca-Cola gift baskets. Camp Sunshine and the swim team also provided prizes for most laps and other fun categories. It was a great success and we've already started thinking about how we can make next year's event even better!"\*

for the entire family, especially 10-year-old Justice, who was undergoing treatment for non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.

"After his second surgery, he was mad and depressed," Shavonn recalls. "It was heartbreaking to watch." She was looking for something positive that would lift his spirits, and thought Family Camp would be just the thing. She was right. "It turned his mood around," she says. "He was so happy on his first day. He didn't have to explain about not having any hair or why he didn't want to be out in the sun. Nobody made it a big deal. We were just a normal family. After that weekend, he was back to being himself."

Justice, who has been cancer-free for two years, has been a regular at summer

camp. His younger sister Arianna attends Sibling Camps. And having just turned 13, he's looking forward to Camp Sunshine's Teen Retreat.

Still, Family Camp is a favorite of the Brown Family.

"Family Camp saved us during our saddest time ever," Shavonn says, "and made things so much better." \* SEPTEMBER

## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

## Living Life to Give Back



At the beginning of each year, Bryan Ferris fills in his calendar with Camp Sunshine dates: Family Camps, Sibling Camps and the week of Teen Camp. "Volunteering at Camp

Sunshine is such an important part of my life that I set those dates in first," Bryan says. "Then

everything else falls into place around those dates. I can miss out on other things, but I don't want to lose my spot at camp."

Bryan has held that spot since 2004, when a friend suggested he volunteer at Camp Sunshine. Until then, he'd been spending his volunteer hours coaching 9- and 10-year-olds in swimming, an activity he did for 15 years.

"I watched those kids grow up," he says, "and I really didn't realize I was having an impact on them until their parents told me later. So, as I was transitioning out of swimming, I was looking for an opportunity to continue to make an impact on kids."

He worked first at Camp Sunshine's Teen Retreat, and then moved to Summer Camp, where he's been a counselor in Cabin 14 with kids age 15 to 18. He also volunteers at the various weekend camps throughout the year.

"The best thing about volunteering at Camp Sunshine is the opportunity you have to make a positive impact in a multitude of ways," says Bryan. "You build relationships, not just with the campers, but with the counselors as well. I look at it as my way to pay it forward."

As much time as Bryan gives to Camp Sunshine, he says he gets back more than he gives. "The environment at camp is so positive and geared towards letting kids reclaim their lives as kids versus patients," he says. "There are campers who just blow you away with their incredible outlook on life. That changes your perspective."

Beyond giving his time, Bryan has made plans to give his money to Camp Sunshine after he's gone. He is a member of Circle of Sunshine, Camp Sunshine's planned giving program, which encourages individuals to include Camp Sunshine in their estate planning.

"I know I am giving to an organization that will put the gift to good use, and I am confident they will be good stewards of my money," he says. "It's important to me to have an impact. Leaving money to Camp Sunshine will be that last opportunity to have an impact."
