
Sunshine Brightens Day For Savannah Families

Tyler's parents, Michael and Dawn, first heard about Camp Sunshine during the early days of Tyler's treatment. "We were invited to go to Family Camp at Ebenezer Retreat (in Rincon)," recalled Tyler's father. "We didn't go that first year, because we were still so overwhelmed. But then in 1999, we made a point to go. We loved it — all of us — and we couldn't wait to go back."

Camp Sunshine, he said, "puts you in touch with others who understand exactly what you are going through. Your friends will try to help you deal with it. But unless you have a child who has gone through this, it is very hard to understand. Camp gives you hope. You see others who have survived

Lauren's Story

Lauren has discovered something she loves even more than being a Camp Sunshine camper – being a Camp Sunshine counselor for teenage girls who are battling cancer just as she was at their age.

A middle school education major at Piedmont College in Demorest, Lauren is busy finishing college, considering her career path and planning her wedding with her fiancé Brent. She is also counting the days until Summer Camp, when she can return for her second year as counselor to the girls in Cabin #3. "I loved it," she said of her inaugural counselor year. "I loved it more than being a camper. I had all the fun I had as a camper. But it was also so rewarding to finally feel like I was giving back for all that people gave to me."



Lauren was 14 years old in November 2000 when she was diagnosed with diabetes insipidus. An MRI determined a brain tumor to be the cause. Lauren underwent brain surgery on December 13, 2000; a biopsy revealed a cancerous condition known as hypothalamic histiocytosis-X. Lauren underwent chemotherapy for 15 months. This year she is celebrating seven years off-treatment and cancer-free.

She first heard about Camp
Sunshine during one of her initial
hospital stays. She decided to test the
waters with a Teen Retreat weekend in
spring of 2001. Ironically, it rained
during much of Lauren's first Camp
Sunshine weekend. "We had to stay
indoors and do inside games and
activities," she recalled. "But I met so
many friends that weekend who are

still my friends today. It was incredible."

Lauren felt at home at camp: "At school, it was always, 'She's the one with cancer.' But at camp, everyone was like family. I guess you would say I felt normal." She seldom missed a teen program or summer camp since.

A highlight of her camper years was the Camp Sunshine teen trip to Washington, DC. "I remember visiting the Capitol, and sitting down and having

lunch with some of the senators, and going through the Holocaust Museum, and seeing all the Washington sights. But I think my favorite part was staying up at night and talking forever with my friends."



Lauren started her college studies at Valdosta State University, but transferred in her sophomore year to Piedmont College. She and Brent met in statistics class and became good friends. When Lauren's father passed away in December 2007 in an all terrain vehicle accident, Brent was there for her. In time, their friendship blossomed, and on New Year's Eve 2008, Brent asked Lauren to marry him. As a couple, they enjoy being outdoors, hiking and four-wheeling, as well as browsing through bookstores and teaching children's Sunday school. They plan to marry on May 22, 2011, on what would have been her parents' 30th wedding anniversary.

While Lauren is happy to share her story with campers, she is sensitive not to force it on them. "If they ask how I became involved with Camp Sunshine, I tell them. And when I tell them, I think it helps," she said. "I tell them, 'You can do it; you can get through this. I had cancer, too, when I was your age.' I believe my story gives them hope."

Ideally, Lauren would like to teach in a hospital setting someday. Her cabin campers would highly recommend her. "As my girls were leaving, they said, 'You are going to be our counselor next year, right?' That made me feel great." *

the Savannah Sand Gnats baseball games and local water park adventures. Tyler has made journeys to participate in Camp Sunshine Summer Camp and an overnight stay at Zoo Atlanta, and Nicholas has participated in Sibling Camp. "Sibling camp is great," his dad commented. "It allows the siblings to talk to each other in a very comfortable setting and to get things off their chest that they might not say to others."

Firsthand Knowledge

Martin Johnston, MD, is a pediatric hematologist-oncologist at Backus Children's Hospital. When he tells families about the benefits of camp for kids with cancer and their families, he speaks from personal experience. His son David is a junior in high school — a good student who likes playing video games and hanging out with friends.

On David's third birthday, he was diagnosed with a less common form of leukemia, called T-cell ALL. David was



treated on a clinical trial, relapsed and then required even more aggressive treatment. He has been off-treatment and cancer-free since he was six years old.

The family — Dr.
Johnston, his wife
Annette, David and
their older son Greg —
were not living in

Savannah during the time of David's cancer battle. They lived in Madison, Wisconsin and then moved to Boise, Idaho. While in Boise, the family was able to participate in Camp Rainbow Gold in Sun Valley. "I love camp," Dr. Johnston said. "As a parent, it is a chance to give your child a normal part of growing up—to let them go to camp and do normal camp activities in an environment that is safe, nurturing and fun with kids they can really relate to."

David's first summer at camp was also the summer the family moved from Madison to Boise. "When school started, my son was the new kid," Dr. Johnston recalled. When the teacher asked him to share something about himself, David talked about cancer camp." He was mobbed with questions

and handled it like a pro, confidently telling his second-grade classmates, "I'll be available for questions later."

At Backus, Dr. Johnston encourages parents to participate in Camp Sunshine programs for themselves and their children: "Camp has so many positive things to offer, and it can truly be life-changing."

Encouraging Connections

Annie Hitt is a Certified Child Life Specialist at Backus, working specifically with children with cancer and their families. Like Dr. Johnston, she is an advocate of Camp Sunshine programs and introduces the concept to families early in diagnosis and treatment. "By taking part in Camp Sunshine programs, they will be able to meet a lot of children and families who are going through the same things they are," she said. "Camp not only brings the family closer together, it also helps the family realize they are not alone."

Hitt is enthusiastic about
Camp Sunshine's latest Savannah
initiative — the Camp Sunshine
Treasure Chest at Backus' pediatric
cancer clinic. "After a difficult
clinic visit, patients can dig in to
the treasure box and pull out a
toy," she explained. Camp Sunshine
is keeping the chest well stocked
with treasures, such as coloring



books, crayons and match box cars.

From Bowling Nights to ballgames to Family Camp, Camp
Sunshine programs offer Savannah area families a chance for
respite and connection, she said: "It is wonderful to see a kid
who has a port go up to another kid and say, Hey, you've got
a port, too. Suddenly, they aren't alone in this any more. It's
also rewarding to see the connection between the families.
Once they go to a Camp Sunshine event or program, they keep
coming back for more!"
