Sibling Camp: A Time and Place for Siblings to Shine

Childhood cancer affects the whole family. After a diagnosis, life is turned upside down for everyone – including brothers and sisters. Camp Sunshine Sibling Camp Weekend was started it 1997 to give brothers and sisters of children with cancer a chance to experience Camp Sunshine and have a weekend that is "all about them." Two families share how Camp Sunshine helps siblings realize they are not alone in this uncertain world of childhood cancer.

THE DAVIS FAMILY



After Grace Lawton Davis returned from a week at Camp Sunshine, she insisted that her sister, Sarah Faith, had to go.

The 16-year-old identical twins share everything, including being born with cerebral palsy.
Grace Lawton – who was diagnosed with acute

lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL) in 2012 – had so much fun at camp that she wanted Sarah Faith to have the same experience.

Since both girls are in wheelchairs, their mother, Wyman, never thought camp was a possibility. But because Camp Sunshine at Camp Twin Lakes is wheelchair accessible, both girls could get around. And she marvels at the fact that camp took extra steps to accommodate Sarah Faith's cerebral palsy, even finding nurses to volunteer specifically to help her.

"Sarah Faith came back with such joy," Wyman remembers. "She had been on the zip line, and for a child with a disability to be able to experience that was amazing." She says that

Sarah Faith has now been to camp three times, most recently in January.

Wyman is also grateful for the support Sarah Faith received from being with other siblings. "They learn that they're not alone in this," Wyman says. "Camp is a safe place where they're not different. It's a fun, welcoming weekend where kids can put aside their worries about their siblings."

Kathy Keye Skinner has a big scar on her stomach where doctors removed her kidney when she was two years old. And she is happy to have that scar.

"Scars tell stories, and I have a story to tell," Kathy says.

Kathy's story starts with a Wilm's tumor that was on her right kidney. Doctors removed her entire



kidney and she underwent chemotherapy and radiation. By age four she was in remission. Her family heard about Camp Sunshine and she went to summer camp in 1987 when she was seven years old. She has gathered stories throughout 19 summers at Camp Sunshine – nine as a

camper and 10 as a counselor.

"Being involved with Camp Sunshine is my way of giving back," Kathy says. "Because of that camp, I am the person I am today."

Her favorite memory is of being eight years old and in the talent show. Kathy loved singing, and sang an a cappella version of "God Bless the USA."

"It was the first time I'd sung anything in front of a big group," Kathy recalls. "When I finished, I looked up

and everyone was clapping and had tears in their eyes. They treated me as if I sang like an angel. That is what camp is all about, a feeling of acceptance, love, and belonging. I knew no one could take that away from me."

Kathy sometimes gets to relive those memories with her fellow counselors. Some of them are longtime volunteers that were there when Kathy was a camper. Her co-counselor in her cabin is a friend and also a former Camp Sunshine camper, and she uses that as an example to show her campers the lasting friendships that can form at camp.

Aside from being a summer camp counselor, Kathy also volunteers at Sibling Camp, Teen Retreat, and Family Camp. She also helps with Camp Sunshine outings such as Shrek and James and the Giant Peach performances.

Kathy, who got married in May 2013, works as a human resources representative, office manager and culture ambassador manager at Stericycle Environmental Solutions, a waste management company in Norcross. The company supports her love of Camp Sunshine by sponsoring a cabin during Summer Camp and donating items to the Sunshine 2 U program.

To Kathy, Camp Sunshine is not only a calling; it's a passion.

Brotherly Bonds Extend to Camp Sunshine

Todd Newberg loves when people ask about the "interesting" bracelet on his wrist. It's a friendship bracelet, made of fishing swivels, that he received the last time he was a counselor at Camp Sunshine.

"The bracelet allows me to open up and tell them about something very important to both me and my family," Todd says. "It continues to be my active connection to the camp."

The Newberg's connection to Camp Sunshine is a sort of family tradition that spans over 20 years in

which the three brothers – Todd and his older brothers Eric and Dan – have all volunteered as counselors at the camp. Their involvement began in 1993, when Eric, the oldest, had just moved to Atlanta from Florida and was looking for a way to get involved in the community. His aunt suggested he volunteer for a week at Camp Sunshine.

A self-proclaimed "camp person," Eric jumped right on board. "It seemed

like a perfect fit," he says. He went that first year, saw what an amazing experience it was and has continued to go every year since. His commitment is so deep that when he accepted his position as chief financial officer for Diaz Foods 18 years ago, he told his new employer he would always need a week off during the summer.

He began as a cabin counselor, but for the last 18 years has been a unit head. He first recruited Todd, who at the time was applying to medical school. He thought it would be a good experience for him. Then he asked middle brother Dan to cover for him one summer when he couldn't go at the last minute. Dan, who was living in New York City working in futures and option trading, agreed.

Dan says the experience also allowed him to participate in something that his two brothers shared. "When we were together over the holidays, Eric and Todd would be looking at pictures and comparing stories," Dan says. "I never knew what they were talking about. But it was an incredible week. Being with those kids was an amazing experience."

When Dan had a chance to relocate from New York, he chose Atlanta to be closer to Eric and his family and Camp Sunshine. He has returned almost every year since

1997 as a cabin counselor for 7 to 9 year olds.

"It's an amazing opportunity to see children who are battling physically and emotionally from the cancer just be a regular camper, like I was," Eric says. "The camp allows children to be children rather than being a child with cancer."

By volunteering for so many years, both Eric and Dan say they have enjoyed watching some of the campers grow up. "You get

to see a kid who was sick at age seven graduate from Georgia Tech," says Eric.

"Or a kid who was homesick and keeps coming back and then becomes a Leader In Training," adds Dan.

Eric has taken his commitment to Camp Sunshine beyond a week in the summer, serving on the board for the last 10 years, including six of them as treasurer. He has also volunteered at Teen Retreats, Remember the Sunshine, the Washington, D.C. Excursion, Lock-Ins, and many other activities throughout the years.

As for Todd, who is now a doctor, he says every year of his service at Camp Sunshine "is a different experience that stays with me." Just like the friendship bracelet he continues to wear.*

Ferrari Maserati of Atlanta Take Kids on "Rides to Remember"

The cars are flying across the track at about 70 miles per hour. These aren't normal race cars – they are "exotic" cars in the form of Ferraris, Maseratis and Porsches.

And inside are some very special passengers: kids.

This event is called "Rides to Remember" and is sponsored on the first Saturday in June every year by Ferrari Maserati of Atlanta. Each year, up to 100 cars circle the track at the Atlanta Motorsports Park in Dawsonville, providing children with cancer and their siblings with a fast ride.

The company has been doing this event for about 10 years, after the daughter of one of its employees

developed cancer.

"Watching the family go
through that tough
experience inspired
everyone to come up with
something we could do
to help," explains Will
Campbell, general
manager of Ferrari
Maserati of Atlanta.

"We have created a day where they don't have to think about what they are going through. We give them a reason to smile and a chance to just be a kid."

The event draws anywhere from 80 to 100 children, and families gather at the Ferrari Maserati of Atlanta store in Roswell, where all the cars that will be driving are staged in a mini car show. Families walk around and see cars that include the very latest models to old classics.

"We want a kid to walk up to a car, and say 'Wow, I want to ride in that," Will says.

With their "dream car" in mind, everyone gets into buses for the ride to Atlanta Motorsports Park, and all 100 cars follow in a mile long caravan, complete with a police escort.

Kids select their cars and ride around the track three times in a lead-follow format where an experienced driver leads 10 to 15 cars at a time,



keeping the speeds safe. After their ride is done, the kids can go pick another car to ride in.

Ferrari Maserati of Atlanta organizes and covers the costs for the entire event, including lunch for the group and carnival-type entertainment. "A lot of people work really hard to pull it together," Will says. "It's a real team effort." And it's all volunteers, including the drivers, who bring their own cars and give the rides. They also get help from a multitude of sponsors, which allows the company to make financial contributions to Camp Sunshine, Ronald McDonald House and CURE Childhood Cancer.

"To see the smile on their faces is worth all the effort," Will says.
"Rides to Remember is meant to be a thrill for them for a day. They can all have a great time and not worry about what else is going on in their lives."*

"The wall probably has 10 or 12 pieces of art on it, all from Camp Sunshine," says Kevin Maguire, the girls' father. "They're all great memories of camp."

The Maguires starting making those memories back in 2011, when they attended their first Family Camp. Charlotte, just four years old at the time, had been diagnosed with ALL in September 2010.

"It was a great opportunity for us to be around other families going through the same experience," Kevin says. "It also helped Charlotte to see other children who were experiencing the same thing as her, such as losing their hair."

Sadie loved Family Camp, so it was no surprise that she

wanted to attend Sibling Camp on her own. Because she was only seven, Kevin says they were a little nervous to let her go on her own, "but she was ready, and we had a level of trust with the Camp Sunshine people."

Sadie has now attended five Sibling Camps, and she especially loves doing crafts, climbing the rock wall and zip lining. She also enjoys visiting with the friends she's made over the years.

"It's an excellent opportunity for siblings to get away, experience a normal weekend, let loose and have fun," Kevin says. "Sadie feels special at the camp, because not a lot of kids get to do this. It has pushed her to try new things, and she has so much fun. We are grateful she has the opportunity to go to Camp Sunshine."*
