NFL Players Form Circle of Friends To Help Kids with Cancer

Through its Circle of Friends program, the foundation gives NFL players the opportunity to champion activities for children with cancer and blood disorders.

Based in Tampa, Florida, Circle of Friends was started several years ago by

NFL player Jerry Wunsch, then a Tampa Bay Buccaneer and now a Seattle Seahawk. In his senior year at the University of Wisconsin, Wunsch lost a young cousin to cancer and made a promise to himself to help children with cancer and chronic blood disorders. As he started his NFL career, Wunsch was introduced to Children's Cancer Center in Tampa and saw a way to make his promise a reality.

Jerry and his wife Melissa created the Wunsch Family Foundation, and the Circle of Friends was born.

Working with player-partners in a number of NFL cities, the Circle of Friends offers programs for kids, ages 8–16, who have cancer or blood disorders.

One of the most popular is the Winter Week trip to Wunsch's hometown of Wausau, Wisconsin, for an unforgettable time of downhill skiing, dog sledding, snowmobiling, horse-drawn sleigh rides and, most especially, peer bonding.

Through his commitment and financial support, King is the Falcons player who helps make it possible for Camp Sunshine campers to enjoy the program. Camp Sunshine campers Ongie, Priya, Dave and Stephen, are among those who have experienced the Circle of Friends' warm embrace. They joined kids from nine other NFL cities who made the Wausau journey.

"Our goal is to increase self-esteem and selfconfidence for the kids, while promoting growth through self-discovery and experiences," said Michelle Pierson, Executive Director of the Wunsch Family Foundation.

The organization's mission is very much in keeping with Camp Sunshine's, Pierson noted, making the two organizations strong partners. "Kids come away from Winter Week knowing I am not so different; I am not alone; I am not facing this struggle by myself," she said. Preschoolers Feel the Warmth of Camp Sunshine Programs

Programs for Young Children

Children don't have to wait until they are old enough for Summer Camp to experience the warmth of Camp Sunshine. Plenty of programs are available for even the youngest children facing cancer and their families.

Ongoing Programs

Family Camp: Offered four times a year at Camp Twin Lakes and once a year at the New Ebenezer Retreat near Savannah, this is a time for families to be together in a relaxed environment away from the stresses of the hospital and clinic.

Family Camp is an opportunity for families to share with others their experiences and feelings about having a child with cancer.

t is a crisp, sunny morning at Camp Sunshine House, and six precious preschoolers – an assortment of moms, dads and siblings in tow – scoot into the playroom ready for Music Class to begin. Several

children are baldheaded from chemotherapy drugs and some say outright that they are not feeling well today. But when the teacher takes out her guitar and starts gently singing an old folk song, smiles light up the playroom like so much sunshine.

Music Class is just one of many Camp Sunshine programs offered throughout the year for preschool children and their families. Cancer knows no age limit. While Camp Sunshine is renowned for its programs for chil-

dren with cancer, including its week-long summer camps for teenagers and youngsters age 7 and up, an array of programs is also available for even the youngest children facing the battle of a lifetime.

Music Class was four-year-old Isabella's first experience with the people and programs of Camp Sunshine. Isabella, her mother April and her brother

William, age 2, first visited Music Class last year. "I really had no idea what to expect," April recalled. "As soon as we walked through the door, I felt embraced by a family. Ann Baker (Camp Sunshine

Program Coordinator) is particularly special to us, because she was the first person we met at the house. Isabella acts like Ann is a movie star. Every time we see her, Isabella smiles and whispers, Look, there she is."

Music Class opened the door for April, her husband Randy and their children to experience many Camp Sunshine offerings, including Family Night, Spa Sydell Night, Family Camp and the Big Apple Circus. The programs are just what the family needed following Isabella's diagnosis at age 1

and subsequent struggle with Stage 3 neuroblastoma. "Isabella went in for her one-year infant checkup on December 30, 2003. When the doctor got to her belly, he could feel hardness there," April said. "I thought she had been eating too much – her belly was so big and full."





I would like to share a fish story with you, except in this story every word is true. Camp Sunshine will celebrate its 25th anniversary in 2007. We are proud of this milestone – a quarter century of helping children with cancer and their families. But accomplishments, milestones and progress are only possible through the commitment and support of an ever-growing community of friends.

In September HD Marine in Buford, in partnership with Wendy's and a host of other supporters, dedicated funds from its annual **Big Ole Bass Benefit Tournament** to Camp Sunshine. For two glorious fall days, approximately 200 teams of fishermen gathered with their families and friends along with Camp Sunshine families at Lake Lanier for fun, fishing, food and fundraising. The winning team reeled in 10 fish, weighing a total of 37.08 pounds. While our hats are off to these skilled anglers, the real winners were all who were touched by this terrific family event.

As HD Marine owner Lee Dodgen said, "I do not want to see a child suffer, and I do not want to see children sick. Anything we can do to make their life better, we are there."



Camp Sunshine is there year-round for children with cancer and their families. On the eve of our Silver Anniversary, I want to thank all of our friends and supporters, old and new, for making this possible. I am particularly struck by the growth we have experienced over the past three years:

- 526 new families registered with Camp Sunshine;
- A 60 percent increase in the number of recreational programs;
- An 80 percent increase in the number of programs at Camp Sunshine House;
- A 90 percent increase in the number of days per year that a Camp Sunshine program is available to children and families.

These are impressive statistics. But as I have said many times, *Camp Sunshine is about children*, not numbers, and we need to be doing more to reach out to every child and family in need of our programs. In this issue, we offer a detailed look at our offerings for preschoolers as seen through the eyes of 4-year-old Isabella and her family. Isabella was diagnosed at her one-year infant checkup with neuroblastoma. Cancer does not discriminate by age. That is why Camp Sunshine provides programs even for the youngest children.

Also in this issue, Camp Sunshine counselor Scott shares his encouraging story of his battle with cancer 20 years ago when he was 13 and diagnosed with Stage II-B Hodgkin's disease. Additionally, you can read about the excitement of the upcoming Big Apple Circus benefit performance and the champion-style support of the Wunsch Family Foundation's Circle of Friends. This program gives NFL players, including Atlanta Falcon Austin King, the opportunity to help kids with cancer or blood disease.

"Even though I wish it on no one, I often think what path would I have taken if cancer had not been part of my life," said Scott. His illness, treatment, survival and triumph have inspired virtually every major decision he has made about college, career, relationships, spirituality and more: "If I can express just one overall message it's that all things work together for good."

Scott was a middle school student in March of 1986 – a strong enough basketball player that even as a seventh grader he was playing on the eighth grade team. What appeared to be a persistent bout with bronchitis, however, began to slow him down. "A family member had walking pneumonia, and my overprotective mom insisted I needed a chest x-ray," Scott recalled. The x-ray revealed not pneumonia, but a grapefruit-sized tumor in his chest.

Scott was sent directly to what was then Egleston Children's Hospital, now Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. A two-week series of tests revealed Stage II-B Hodgkin's disease. His doctors recommended an 18-month protocol, including chemotherapy followed by radiation therapy.

"The first day I got the news was the only time I let my mind drift to what if, what if. Once the battle started, I never allowed myself to think that way again," he recalled. "Instead I thought I have to hurry up and get better because I have to get ready for the next basketball season. It

Scott's Story

When Camp Sunshine counselor Scott tells people, "Cancer saved my life," he is not saying it for shock value. He resolutely believes his battle with Hodgkin's lymphoma at the age of 13 has positively influenced every step of his life's journey for the past 20 years.


was all about playing ball; it was all about getting well."

As Scott was nearing the end of his treatment, his medical problems were critically compounded when he was exposed to chicken pox; his immune system already compromised, Scott contracted a severe case of shingles. "It was a very serious situation," he said. "My mom was told that I might not survive."

With high-dosage antibiotics and tremendous fortitude, Scott did survive. In fact, at the end of his treatment for shingles he required no further chemotherapy or radiation. He has been cancer-free ever since.

In addition to excellent medical care, Scott believes he experienced "a kind of divine healing" at that point in his life. He knows for certain he was the recipient of steadfast love. One of his most vivid memories of that time is his mother's constant presence. "She was always there either at my side or in the chair bed trying to get a little sleep," he said. "I felt I was extremely blessed."

Adding to his blessing was the encouragement of other friends in treatment to try Camp Sunshine. "I was 13 years old, I was still on cancer treatment, it was the first time I had ever been away from home, and I loved it," Scott said. "I was just so glad to be with other kids who had cancer. I was glad there were no parents around and that we could stay up late and have fun. It was a whole new world for mea world where I was totally welcome and could be myself without having to prove muself to anyone."



Scott has been a part of Camp Sunshine now for two decades, first as a camper and for the past many years as a volunteer counselor. He credits his early camp experiences not only with helping him survive cancer, but also guiding him on a college and career path. Scott is a graduate of the University of Georgia with a degree in psychology. After working for several years with Atlanta Public Schools, Scott heeded a call to youth ministry and is the Director of Street Jam Ministries, an outreach program of the interdenominational Church in the Now in Conyers. It was through Street Jam that he met his wife Lindsey, a volunteer for the ministry.

"Street Jam is an outreach that goes into at-risk communities and seeks out at-risk kids," he explained. The ministry offers a wide range of services from tutoring and mentoring, to organizing basketball and other sports, to providing school supplies, Thanksgiving baskets and holiday gifts. "Street Jam is not just delivering a religious message," Scott noted, "we are also teaching life skills." In Scott, the ministry has quite a role model.*

Early Childhood Outings

An ultrasound revealed an abdominal mass. On the following day, New Year's Eve, the family was in the pediatric oncologist's office for more definitive testing. "The doctors told us it was one of the biggest masses they had ever seen in a child her size," April said. "It was about the size of a Nerf football. It was pressing on her vena cava (one of two large veins returning blood to the

heart)." It proved to be malignant.

Babu Isabella began a treatment regimen, which included four rounds of chemotherapu and surgeries at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta (CHOA) at Scottish Rite, Even in the darker moments, the family found great hope. "It was on New Year's Eve, the very night we had been to see the oncologist that Isabella took her

first steps," her mother recounted. "Somehow that helped us to see further down the road for Isabella." The family is thankful for the special care they received at CHOA. "Dr. (Louis) Rapkin is our hero...he and his wonderful nurse Stephanie Romanelli," April said.

After 11 months of treatment, Isabella's cancer was in remission – and her baby brother William had been born. Isabella was off-treatment when April first learned about Camp Sunshine from another mother of a child with neuroblastoma. "At first, I hesitated about going, because I thought it was for families who were in the middle of dealing with their child's cancer,"

April said. "But what I realize is that childhood cancer affects the whole family and not just in the crisis moments but at other times, too, as you continue down this path."

In addition to Music Class, the family thoroughly enjoyed last year's Big Apple Circus (see circus story in this issue). Isabella and her mother have attended Spa Sydell Night at Camp Sunshine

House. "Spa Sydell Night is amazing – just amazing," April commented. "Isabella was like a little diva. She had her fingernails done, her toenails done, and even put on a little lipstick. She felt pampered and cared for."

Last spring's
Family Camp was a
hit not only with
Isabella, but with
her parents and
brother, too. "There
were so many fun
activities," her

mother said. "We all painted birdhouses and loved it. Isabella still talks about the weekend."

As a parent, April's favorite program is Family Night held first and third Tuesday each month. "It is incredible being able to share with others what it is like to live with childhood cancer," she said. "You come looking for hope and continue finding hope. We talk about real stuff – real issues. I thought I would be an encouragement to others, and I hope I have been that. But I also found that I had unresolved issues and confusion of my own, and other parents with similar experiences have been there for me. I would really encourage families to try it."


