19 Campers Honored With Sunshine Scholarships

Landscape architect... pediatric oncology nurse... teacher... innovator... pro golfer... military leader... biomedical engineer. For childhood cancer survivors, planning for college, career and the future is especially meaningful. Camp Sunshine is proud to announce a record 19 recipients of the Camp Sunshine Scholarship for former campers now attending a college, university or technical school.

Camp Sunshine's Board of Directors established the scholarship in 1992 in memory of Stephen Doak, an accountant with Joseph Decosimo & Co., who provided pro bono services to camp and who died of lymphoma. The scholarship fund was expanded in 2000 in memory of camper Jennifer Allen. The recession meant a cutback in scholarship awards in recent years. However, thanks to fiscal prudence and the receipt of two large planned gifts in 2013, the scholarship fund was reinstated this year – empowering even more former campers to pursue their dreams.

"Receiving the scholarship from the people who have come to mean so much to me was such a great honor," noted recipient Erin Dunton. "Camp Sunshine will forever hold a special place in my heart, and I intend to be a part of this amazing organization for the rest of my life."

Every scholarship applicant submits an essay about his or her cancer journey. Here are excerpts from just some of these remarkable future leaders.

Camp gave so much to me... I honestly do not believe that I would be the person I am today had I not attended camp.

Camp Sunshine not only allowed me to meet 10 of my best friends and make memories I will never forget, it also gave me a confidence that I could not have gotten anywhere else.

Camp taught me that having cancer is 'okay.' Growing up and being different from other people is not an easy thing, and Camp Sunshine taught me that having cancer is nothing to be embarrassed or shy about; rather it is a blessing that I was able to overcome something so terrible at such a young age... To me, having cancer was a gift. It sets me apart from most people, especially people my age, and allows me to appreciate life so much more.

For as long as I can remember, nurses have been a huge part of my life. There was Jo... Momma Duck... Tara... Kristi. These women, along with many others, have significantly influenced my decision to become a nurse. My experiences as a childhood cancer patient have shown me that my calling is to work in Pediatric Oncology.

I believe our life experiences of each day shape us into the person we will be tomorrow. After five years of being in remission, I find myself here (at Georgia Regents University), trying to fulfill my lifelong dream. In spite of the obvious obstacles I have faced, I graduated from high school, started college, joined a sorority and try to live each day to the fullest. Instead of choosing to let cancer run my life, I embraced it and it has helped make me the person I am today. Some probably think that my health will get in the way, but I see it as a strength, not a weakness, and I know it will make me an excellent nurse.



“How Can I Not Give Back?”

Sean Bailey's cancer journey might have overpowered a less relentless traveler. "But persistence is my thing," he said. Fourteen years after a devastating diagnosis of acute myeloid leukemia (AML), Sean displays the same resolute spirit as a volunteer counselor as he did as a young camper.

Sean was in the sixth grade when he started developing distressing symptoms, including unusual bruising and a cold that would not go away. "One day my neck was so stiff, I couldn't move an inch," he recalled. "Call it mother's instinct, but my mom knew something was wrong with me." Blood tests at the pediatrician's office resulted in a phone call that very afternoon. "They said I had cancer and needed to be at Egleston right away."

The 100-mile trek from the family's home in Warner Robins to Atlanta was the first step on Sean's defining path. "My life became treatment after treatment. I can't remember who or how I was introduced to Camp Sunshine, but I do remember going to camp the first time. Amy (Moosbrugger) was there. She was amazing the way she made me feel at home. Camp was a dream come true – to be able to chill out, talk to people, play games and be a kid again."

Moreover, camp helped sustain Sean during the challenges ahead. After an initial remission, he developed a fungal infection in his lung, a complication of the cancer, which eventually resulted in surgical removal of his right lung. In July of 2003, Sean began bruising again and experienced a relapse of AML. His only treatment option was

an autologous bone marrow transplant. It was successful. "I had no complications," he said. He has been cancer-free for 10 years.

Sean was a recipient of the Camp Sunshine scholarship in 2007 as an undergraduate at University of Georgia. After receiving a science education degree from UGA, Sean went on to become a pharmacy technician at Egleston and is now pursuing a pharmacy degree at Mercer University. He is equally focused on his commitment to Camp Sunshine. "As a

kid, I went to every camp program I could go to," he said. "I volunteered on the Teen Council, and I didn't miss a single summer camp since my diagnosis." He completed camp's Leader in Training (LIT) program. For the past three years, he has volunteered as a cabin counselor for Junior Week and volunteered for the first time at Family Camp this fall.

"Why would I *not* volunteer? There is no other option in my mind but to give back to this place that has given so much to me," Sean reflected. "I want

to introduce the people I love to this special place. At camp, kids realize they are not alone. The strongest medicines can be things like friendship and fun – the things that camp provides."*



"I love being a volunteer. It's totally different being on this side of camp. The kids will wear you out... but they also allow you to experience your inner kid."

I was diagnosed with leukemia at two years old, and my parents were told that if I survived I would probably have severe side effects for the rest of my life. The chemotherapy was expected to cause learning disabilities in both math and science. Against those odds, I have attended nationals twice on my school's Science Olympiad team. I was also invited into the Science National Honor Society and achieved a perfect science score on the ACT.

According to (statistics), less than two percent of teenagers have started their own business. Against those odds I founded a shaved-ice business... Less than 27 percent of teenagers have donated over \$2,766 to charity. Against those odds I have donated over \$6,000 to charities... Throughout my life the odds have been stacked against me. Yet statistics have not defined me but instead have made me unique and determined to overcome whatever adversity I face.

I have seen a one-legged man climb the rock wall in 42 seconds.

I have seen a wheelchair-bound kid ride a horse like he was born to be a jockey. I have seen a partially blind boy hit the bull's eye of an archery target not just once, but three times in succession. Seeing all my fellow campers live out their belief that they can do anything has inspired me in my career path.

Whether or not I can accomplish my dream of becoming a professional golfer on the PGA Tour, I see a very realistic and beneficial way of serving my community and those less fortunate than I am... Golf is a great vehicle to be able to give back and teach. The smiles I have seen at the mini golf course at camp when a putt is made is remarkable, and I cannot but imagine the fun and smiles from (campers) learning how to golf.

Spa Sydell and Camp: It's a Beautiful Thing



The bond between Camp Sunshine and Atlanta's premier Spa Sydell dates back so many years that founder Sydell Harris said, "I'd have to count my camp bracelets to know for sure."

It was about 25 years ago, back when summer camp was held at Camp Barney Medintz, that Sydell and her husband Arthur first visited camp and fell in love with it. She remembers standing outside on a wooden platform doing make-up for the girls, while Arthur and their son Richard played Frisbee with the boys. "It was an incredible experience . . . in the heat of the summer, being there with those children," she recalled. "From then on, Camp Sunshine has been such an important part of our lives and part of our culture at Spa Sydell."

New owner Reina Bermudez cherishes the legacy: "I didn't know about Camp Sunshine until I started working at Spa Sydell in 2007. But I quickly realized how important this relationship is; there is never a doubt this is where our heart is."

For Reina, it is personal. Her father is a cancer survivor and her brother is on chemotherapy. She is the mother of a blended family of seven children. "I love, love, love children," she said. "They are sweet and innocent and rambunctious. To see a sick child, a child

with cancer, it breaks your heart. This is something we can do to make a difference in the lives of these families."

In addition to providing spa services to campers at summer camp, Spa Sydell Nights are held every other month on the second Monday from 6:00-8:00PM at the Camp Sunshine House. Camp families can take the time to relax and rejuvenate with the professionals from Spa Sydell, enjoying massage, reflexology, facials and manicures. "We have wonderful technicians. To see the staff so involved by volunteering their time and talents is wonderful," Reina said. "It's not as if you have to ask the employees to please take a turn . . . everybody signs up! Everyone loves being a part of this tradition."

Sydell still participates in spa nights when she can: "We talk to the families and hear their stories and realize these are unbelievable people. Arthur says the kids are the biggest heroes you could ever imagine. I always tell people if you come to Camp Sunshine your life will change. Sometimes in life the smallest things can upset you and you think how am I going to handle this. At camp, you realize what these families are going through and it puts things in a different perspective. Camp Sunshine is powerful – it makes you realize how special life is." *
