f postcards had been made of the early summers at Camp Sunshine, they would most likely capture scenes of beautiful

mountain lakes, open fields, horseback riding trails, rustic cabins, evening campfires, and a rising flag in morning light. If you added children to those scenes, they would be jumping into the deep blue waters of the lake, playing kickball in the fields, riding horses along the trails and singing around the campfire. The sounds in those pictures would be of children

story, the four camps that have been home to our summer camp. All have been a part of creating memories and opportunities for the children and teens at Camp Sunshine – giving them a place to grow, laugh, play and just be kids.

In 1983, 40 children gathered at Camp High Harbour on Lake Burton for the inaugural year of Camp Sunshine. "It was our very

first camp and it took a leap of faith to try something so new for the first time," says Camp Sunshine Executive Director Sally Hale.

Nancy and Vicki's Story

"It's the best week of their lives, and they make friendships that last forever." – Vicki, Reese's mom

When Hayes Burrow was leaving on the bus to Camp Sunshine for the first time in 1999, his mother, Nancy, dropped him off with a box full of medication and waved goodbye in tears.

"I knew it would be good for him, but I couldn't imagine him being away for a week," remembers Nancy. "He was only nine years old and very sick."

Just the year before, Hayes was diagnosed with a peripheral

primitive neuroectodermal tumor. His treatment required 52 weeks of chemotherapy, with a hospital stay every three weeks. It was during his treatment that the Burrows learned about Camp Sunshine.

"The nurses at the hospital really encouraged us," Nancy says. "I knew it would be good for him to go."

Vicki Cherry was also a little reluctant to let her son, Reese, go to summer camp as he was in the throes of his treatment for acute lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL). He had been diagnosed at age seven in October 1999. While at the hospital, other mothers told Vicki about Camp Sunshine and encouraged her to attend Family Camp. The Cherrys went in the spring of 2000 and after that, all Reese could talk about was going to summer camp.

"I knew that because of his treatment schedule, Reese would be sick the week of camp," Vicki says, "but he was determined to go."

Nancy and Vicki are among the hundreds of parents who have entrusted

Camp Sunshine to care for and nurture their children for a week of summer camp over the last 35 years. And these two mothers – like so many others – say that the experience for their children was "transformative."

"Hayes came back so much more independent," Nancy says. "At the time he had to take 16 rather large potassium pills. I would cut them in half for him. When he returned, he said 'watch this' and took them all by himself without me cutting them or helping him in any way. He was very proud."

Vicki says that Reese did have a tough time and the counselors actually thought they were going to have to send him home, but by Wednesday of that week he was much better, which gave him confidence and made him more hopeful. "He learned that it's okay to not feel good, and you can still participate in things," she says. "When he came home, he had transformed back into a normal kid."

After their first year, Hayes and Reese returned to Camp

Sunshine every summer until they were 18. Their mothers also got involved. Vicki volunteered at Camp Sunshine House over the years, and joined the staff as Camper Services Administrator in January 2016. Nancy volunteered at CURE Childhood Cancer Atlanta and became Camp Sunshine's Special Events and Communications Manager in December 2015.

"We are both here because we had the courage to drop our children off," says Vicki. "We believe in Camp Sunshine's mission because we saw what it could do."

Both mothers agree their sons' camp experience shaped the young men they have become, instilling in them a sense of compassion and a desire to help others. When he graduated from high school, Reese donated all the money he received to Camp Sunshine in honor of three camp friends who didn't live to see their high school graduation. Hayes was a Leader in Training (LIT) one year at Camp Sunshine, and then went to work for Camp Twin Lakes for an entire summer. He is now in dental

school and plans to be an oral surgeon.

Nancy and Vicki both encourage new families to attend Camp Sunshine Family Camp where everyone in the family can experience Camp Twin Lakes and all the activities. The children then feel more comfortable with the camp when they go on their own.

"It's very difficult to let a seriously ill child go," acknowledges Vicki. "But you can't let your fears get in the way of an incredible life changing experience. It's the best week of their lives, and they make friendships that last forever."

"It was there we began so many of our camp traditions: the first friendship bracelet, the first campfire, the first camper awards and writing our camp song!"

After two years at Camp High Harbour, Camp Sunshine moved to Camp Coleman in Cleveland, Ga., in 1985. A new home brought new traditions and memories, including more activities just for teens and the annual bus trip back to Lake Burton for a day.

As Camp Sunshine continued to grow, so did the need for space. Staying in the north Georgia community of Cleveland, Camp Barney Meditz became Camp Sunshine's home from 1987-1992. The staff there taught our campers there were no limitations to what they could do, adapting activities to their abilities – waterskiing, horseback riding, ropes course, archery or swimming. The last summer, campers painted two murals – one to leave behind at Camp Barney and one to take to the new home at Camp Twin Lakes.

Camp Sunshine was THE turning point in my son's recovery. He came home from his camp with a new purpose and understanding that he can beat cancer, he is normal and that he will be just like everyone else. – Mother of a camper, 2016 Our son had a marvelous time. He came home a different child. He is more sure of himself. The camp also taught him to be independent. Thank you for making this one of the best summers for him.

Throughout the years in North Georgia, Camp Sunshine continued to return to the place where it all began – Lake Burton. "We had 'Thursdays at Lake Burton' where we bussed everyone back to Lake Burton and were met with a fleet of pontoon boats," remembers Sally. "It was a special place for us where strangers really did open their homes and hearts to kids who just wanted to be kids again."

In 1993, after much anticipation, Camp Sunshine had a new camp to call home, Camp Twin Lakes. "We finally had a home built just for us, allowing us to have programs all year long," says Sally. "At Camp Twin Lakes, we have grown our summer camp and added camps for families, siblings, teens and for families who return to remember their child who is no longer with us."

Camp Sunshine's budget has gone from \$25,000 the first year to over \$1.8 million today. The camp has

grown from 40 campers and one week of camp to serving 400 campers in two weeks of summer camp plus 140 additional programs and over 7,000 participants today. But with all those changes, some things have remained the same.

"Home is where we are together," Sally says. "These camps have been part of our journey where our campers have made lasting friendships and a lifetime of memories together. Our parents tell us Camp Sunshine has the same profound impact on the lives of children with cancer today as it did during our first camp in 1983 at Camp High Harbour." *****

When parents were surveyed about summer camp, 100 percent reported their child was able to meet other campers going through similar situations and that camp helped their child experience normal childhood activities. And nearly all said their child came home with more self-confidence, increased independence and a sense of pride about something they had accomplished at camp.

COMMUNITY PARTNER

Camp Twin Lakes Celebrates 25 Years

In the late 1980s, it became apparent that Camp Sunshine needed a permanent home. Doug Hertz, a Camp Sunshine board member, took on the challenge and commitment and started the long journey of building a camp to be used by Camp Sunshine as well as other camps for special children.

At that time there were not many camps for children with special needs around the country. Doug Hertz and the Camp Twin Lakes team turned to Camp John Marc in Texas as a model for the new camp in Georgia. The team took what they learned and designed a camp with a full medical facility, air conditioned cabins and other features to make the camp comfortable and accessible or campers. Georgia-Pacific generously donated the



initial land near Rutledge. In 1993, Camp Twin Lakes opened to seven nonprofit community organizations, including Camp Sunshine, to provide summer camp serving 1,000 children.

For the last 25 years, Camp Twin Lakes has given thousands of Georgia's children with serious illnesses, disabilities, and other life challenges a chance to experience summer camp like other children. These include children with arthritis, asthma, epilepsy, hearing disorders, heart problems and kidney disorders, as well as those experiencing grief.

And like Camp Sunshine, Camp Twin Lakes has grown over the years and expanded its programs.

"Today, Camp Twin Lakes collaborates with 64 different partner organizations to facilitate year-round camp programs at three medically supportive, fully-accessible campsites in Rutledge, Winder and Warm Springs," says Jill Morrisey, Chief Executive Officer of Camp Twin Lakes, adding that they also provide "Camp-to-Go" programs at children's hospitals throughout Georgia. "In 2016, we served 10,000 campers," she says.

The camp also has also expanded to include a working farm with 50 head of cattle, 200 chickens and five alpaca. Morrisey says last year, the camp harvested more than 10,500 pounds of produce, 4,600 pounds of grass-fed beef and 16,000 eggs from the farm that was used in the dining hall as well as to provide educational programming about healthy eating and where their food comes from.

"We are so grateful for our partnership with Camp Twin Lakes," Camp Sunshine Executive Director Sally Hale says. "It has allowed us to grow our programs and focus on our mission to enrich to lives of Georgia's children with cancer and their families."*
